What is Paediatric Outpatients?

The outpatients department is for children who need to go to hospital to get medical treatment.

Lots of different medical treatments happen in outpatients. Children go to the outpatient department for lots of different reasons.



Getting to the Hospital

There are lots of ways to get to the hospital. I can get to the hospital by train, bus, car or walking.



I can go in the main entrance to the hospital.

Getting to Outpatients

To get to Outpatients I can go in the main entrance and use Lift A. Outpatients is in the blue zone on level 4.

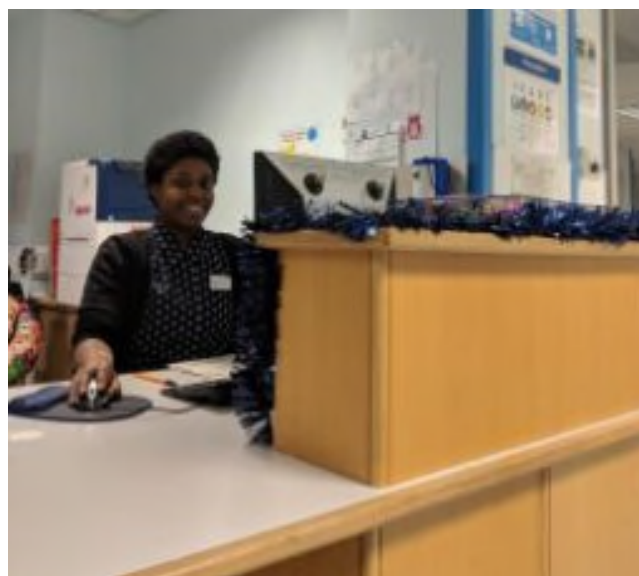


I can follow signs to find outpatients. Outpatients is also called Clinic 4D.

Talking to Reception

I can tell reception that I am here. The receptionist might ask what my name is.

I can show the receptionist my appointment letter and my hospital passport.



Waiting to be seen

I can sit in the waiting area if I want to. I can play with the toys if I want to.



The doctor will call my name when they are ready.

Seeing the doctor

I can follow the doctor to their room. My adult can come with me. I can sit down in the doctor's room.



The doctor might ask me questions. I can ask the doctor questions.

Getting medical treatment

The doctor may check my ears, mouth, chest and tummy.



The doctor or nurse may also check my height and weight. They may give me medicines to make me feel better.

What happens next

I am ready to go home now!

I can say goodbye to the Doctors and Nurses.



I can follow the signs to leave the hospital.
