Students are studying Romeo and Juliet as part of their English Literature GCSE. They also wrote reviews; here are a selection:













At the start of the term, students paid a visit to London Zoo!










Students enjoyed visiting the zoo so much, one student was also heard saying, "I wonder if I could get a Giraffe to take home?"


Home Education

Over the summer, one of our home learning students also took part in the Islington Reading Challenge, successfully completing the entire challenge! This is an amazing achievement, congratulations!


All the students were able to celebrate and share your success on the last day of term, with a lovely assembly.


This half term we have been learning across different subjects under the themed topic of 'Humans'. We have been looking closely at the human skeleton and the different bones, which allow us to function as beings




We also looked at other organisms and their skeletons and created a 'Funny bones' art display.
