## Top Tips for Developing Language and Social Communication Skills

A guide for Parents/Carers



Secure your child's attention and allow for processing time (especially when giving them instructions).	Get down to your child's level; give a simple instruction and WAIT! (Sometimes up to 10 seconds!!)  Sammy, wash hands.
Use <b>simple</b> language - less is more!	Don't overload your child with words. For example, say "shoes on" instead of "now it's time to go and get your shoes and put them on".
Create motivation and a desire to communicate. This will foster engagement with you.	Plan fun and motivating activities around your child's interests and explore these with your child. For example, if they love dinosaurs: act dinosaurs together, count dinosaurs, read books about dinosaurs etc.
	Use a range of sensory experiences to engage your child e.g., playing with water, sand, paint, outdoors/indoors, sitting/standing.
	Set up a 'What's in the Box?'. Maximise motivation with exciting toys and only let your child play with you for short bursts of time. One toy at a time. Child and adult can touch/play with toys.

Play fun <b>back and forth t</b> urn taking games.	Throwing and catching a ball, taking turns blowing bubbles, taking turns pushing a car down the track, blowing and releasing balloons, are all ideas to develop back-and-forth sequences of interaction.
Model, Model, Model!	Model simple and functional language to your children all day, every day! Model the names of things you see, the actions you are doing, the colours of things, the placed you are going etc.  Model play sequences to your child e.g., giving dolly milk and putting to bed.
Use visual methods to support your child to process and understand information and use in their own communication.	Use visuals/gestures to help your child understand difficult concepts like time and when things are finishing.  5,4,3,2,1finished  Support your child to request when they want 'more' or when they need 'help'.  Flat hand, polim down, correst top of other fist.  More  Help
